

Our theme this week was Spooky Spiders. Our sensory table was filled with artificial spider webs and plastic spiders. The older Seedlings worked their fine motor skills as they attempted to remove the spiders from the web using their fingers and plastic tweezers. Once they removed the spiders from the web, they placed them inside jars. They also used magnifying glasses to get a closer look at the spiders that they caught in the jars. We also practiced counting the spiders.

We read the book *The Very Busy Spider* by Eric Carle. The story shows the hard work that a spider puts into their web to be able to catch their food. We also read *Spider on the Floor* which is an adaptation of the song by Raffi. I used a large toy spider to go along with the story as the spider moves to different parts of the body. This was a great way to name our different body parts in a fun and silly way. We also sang "The Itsy Bitsy Spider" and moved our hands to the song. For our art activities, the Seedlings used crayons to color a picture of a spider hanging from their webs. They also used dot markers to create spiders on a web.

On Monday, the Saplings marked the discovery of the New World by Christopher Columbus, concurrently acknowledging Indigenous People's Day. We studied maps and globes to recognize the positions of Spain, India, North and South America. We then painted maps of Christopher Columbus' journey across the Atlantic to the New World. Moreover, we fashioned beaded necklaces inspired by those of the Taino Natives, whom Christopher Columbus encountered upon his arrival in the Bahamas.



This week's music activities involved creating percussion music with Lummi

sticks, a musical instrument named after the Lummi Native American peoples. The sticks' songs target gross and fine motor skills, as well as bilateral coordination, an important skill that will help children develop skills such as tying shoes, getting dressed, playing toss and even riding a bike.

On Tuesday, our *Monster Mash* theme took center stage, featuring an examination of the color purple, an interactive activity centered on mixing up some purple monster slime, and an educational counting exercise incorporating Monster eyes and purple playdough. Utilizing sponge painting, Saplings created spooky scary monsters and subsequently cut them out with the silly scissors.

Wednesday's lesson integrated the two themes through a reading of Maurice Sendak's *Where The Wild Things Are*, which recounts Max's sailing journey to the land of wild creatures. We discussed the importance of home and the idea that sometimes, no place compares. We investigated the elements that make our homes special. We considered how the wild things, with their formidable roars and physical characteristics, accepted Max into their tribe. Saplings then designed their own Wild Things using yarn for textures. Furthermore, Saplings worked on *Wild Things* patterning cards, sequencing activities, and pattern recognition. They also participated in prewriting activities and beginning sound exploration.

K & 1st Grade Elementary Teacher

This week was short but sweet. We started a science unit about the sun and weather. We did an experiment to see if the sun would heat up rocks, sand, or water better. We learned about Galileo and his discoveries in the sky and the invention of the thermometer! We will continue to learn about the weather and seasons over the next few weeks.

The first graders learned about parts of a story. We discussed and made a concept map of the characters, setting, and plot. In math, we are learning about how to add by counting on. We can count on from a big digit number now. The students were successful in adding 87+7! Representing subtraction was introduced this week.

The Kindergarteners learned about the letter i and J! We are practicing decoding three-letter words already! We practice writing letters daily, focusing on the motions of each letter and the size. I focus on learning to write all of the lowercase



letters first. In math, we are practicing addition and subtraction. We are learning about how adding is more and subtracting is less. The students also learned about and practiced writing numbers 6-10.

2nd & 3rd Grade Elementary Teacher

This week was short and sweet! We did many housekeeping things, like cleaning desks and finishing up projects. This was a great way to wrap up many of our things. We did a Picasso painting, which the students thought was hilarious and so much fun. We have had lots of talks about not taking our art so seriously and playing around with our imagination. This has alleviated a lot of pressure the kids were putting on themselves about it being perfect. We also did some activities surrounding habitats and how animals survive within a habitat. This will be a continued unit when we have more time. Students were able to check out more books for the long



weekend and they were beyond excited! This will give them lots of opportunities to spend reading.

In reading, we focused on long I sound and consonant blends. This was paired with plural and singular words. Our books were focused on a biography of Roberto Clemente and a funny realistic fiction book called "Teachers Pet." With these texts, we focused on story elements and cause and effect comprehension strategies.

In math, both grades were focused on place value and using place value to build understanding with addition and subtraction. There was also the first introduction to regrouping numbers. Students approached this with so much excitement. Over the long weekend, students can practice this at home by making up their own problems and having you check them. We will continue to work on these skills over the next several weeks.

From Ms. Stacy Coronis

4th & 5th Grade Elementary Teacher

Grades 4 and 5 have squeezed a lot of learning into our short 3 day week. We will start a new math unit on multidigit multiplication next week so last week and this week we practiced many number sense skills including multiples, factors, GCF, venn diagrams, factor trees, prime factorization, composite numbers, square numbers and exponents..... Phew! At the end of each week students have a chance to take a math facts test in addition, subtraction, multiplication and division and then we celebrate our successes on Monday morning by signing the posters on our "Wall of Fame". Students have made so much progress and many have mastered all four operations. Students who have not mastered these facts yet should continue to study each night as the next multiplication unit will require fact fluency.

During reading all students participated in their reading group by reading differentiated fiction and nonfiction passages. Students worked with passages at their reading level and



practiced identifying text evidence to support their inferences. Students also worked on their differentiated Lexia plan and had some extra independent daily reading (IDR) time reading a chapter book at their level. Students will take their chapter book home over the long weekend!

In writing we started the process for writing a persuasive letter. Students started by reading a persuasive essay and then used a graphic organizer to identify the author's opinion, the main reasons for supporting their viewpoint, and the details given to support the reasons given. By breaking down the essay students were able to identify the structure of the persuasive piece. Then we worked backwards by creating a graphic organizer for our own persuasive piece and will use this to publish a letter to the Birch Grove School Board about an idea that we are very excited about! Stay tuned!

In our content area we focused on health and were lucky to have our school nurse, Ms. Gayle, be our guest teacher. Students learned about the stages of development and personal hygiene. As the girls and then the boys met with Ms. Gayle, they had the opportunity to learn about many important changes that occur during puberty and had time to ask questions. All students brought home some personal hygiene items and additional information and activities for optional use at home. Although students had apprehension and nerves prior to the class, they left feeling good about knowing what to expect. Thank you Ms. Gayle!!
